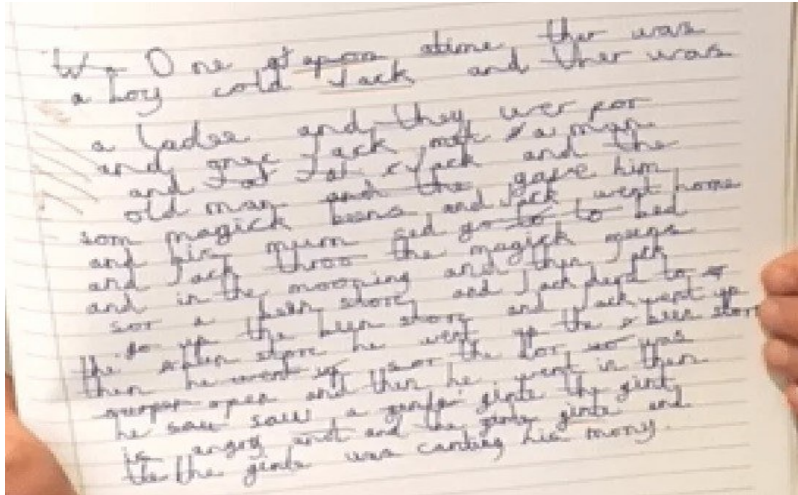


Children's Handwriting & Psychology

OVERVIEW

AGE CALIBRATION & MOTOR DEVELOPMENT

RECOMMENDED CORRECTIONS & EXERCISES

1. High 't' Bar Challenge

Encourage your child to place 't' bars slightly higher on the stem during creative writing. This simple shift helps to foster a sense of healthy ambition and higher goals. It builds the confidence to dream a little bigger. Practise this in a fun, relaxed way by writing short adventure stories together once a week.

2. Rhythmic Large Ovals

Have your child draw large, flowing ovals on plain paper to encourage fluid movement. This exercise helps to maintain their relaxed grip and prevents future tension as writing speed increases. It ensures that their logical thinking remains flexible. Do this for two minutes before starting homework to help them settle into a flow.

3. Right Margin Awareness

Ask your child to try and reach closer to the right-hand edge of the paper. This gentle exercise encourages social reaching and reduces any minor tendencies towards caution. It helps them feel more comfortable moving toward the unknown or new social situations. Use unlined paper occasionally to help them find their own natural boundaries.

4. Upper Loop Extensions

Practise making the loops of letters like 'l' and 'h' slightly taller and fuller. This promotes a sense of wonder and imaginative thinking. It helps balance their logical mind with a bit of creative flair. You can turn this into an art activity by decorating the tall letters with different colours.

5. Garland Stroke Flow

Encourage 'u' shaped connections between letters to soften the script. This promotes empathy and a friendly, receptive attitude towards others. It harmonises their social interactions and makes communication feel more effortless. Use this when writing thank-you notes or cards to friends to emphasise the connection between people.
